Sr. Eva, along with many of the other Sisters of the Holy Family, knew me from my younger days when I was a little more “troublesome.” Several of them still joke about the “miracle” that it is that I work for the church (hahaha...). Her response was, “Well you are coming to the



Institute too...and Fr. Mike is going to pay for it.” She then added, “This is great news!” before I could even respond. Before I knew it, I had an IBCS brochure and application in my hand. The young lady I came to see was dying laughing at the whole interaction. That is how Sr. Eva operated. She worked out of faith and

She was proud of her heritage as an African American woman. She was proud of her religious community, the Sisters of the Holy Family. She was also proud about being Catholic. Bishop Joseph N. Perry

The heroic virtues of these two popes not only underscore our fond memories of their ministry but serve to stir up among us faith in the Petrine service to the Church established by Christ and founded on the rock of the apostle Peter.





Black Catholic Spotlight

This month's spotlight is on someone who has gone to Glory with God. Her name was Iris Gueringer. She was a remarkable woman, a mother, and parish leader who loved the Church. Devoted member of St. Anselm Church on Chicago's Southside and where she raised her eight children, and St. Lawrence O'Toole Church in the South Suburbs, where she lived her later years. Iris died in 2012. St. Lawrence O'Toole's Kwanzaa Committee has established a scholarship as a memorial to her. The reflection below

was submitted by Carole Haymon, a member of the Kwanzaa Committee and someone who since her childhood knew Iris and her remarkable family.

Fond Memories of Iris Gueringer

My earliest remembrance of Mrs. Gueringer and her family is in the early 1960's at St. Anselm Catholic Church. I would see this lovely lady at Sunday Mass with her large family. It was not unusual to see large families with more than 2.5 children at mass.



There was something special about this family. The Gueringer family commanded attention because Iris was always pleasant and the children were polite. The girls were dressed in nice dresses and their curly hair was neatly arranged in pig tails. The boys were groomed well from head to toe in wrinkle free white shirts and dark pants. Some of the boys were altar servers and ushers during their teen years into adulthood. They were active participants of Sunday worship.

I was in awe of Mrs. Gueringer and family because they consistently practiced the faith diligently and reverently. I did not have the pleasure of being a classmate of any of the Gueringer Clan. My observation of Iris was of a loving, caring and practical mother that provided and instilled the Catholic Faith in her children. My personal observation proved to be correct when Mrs. Gueringer and I reconnected thirty years later at St. Lawrence O'Toole Catholic Church. She attended Sunday Mass with her daughters, Margot and Odette and other family members.

The reunion was an endearing experience during a Kwanzaa Celebration. The earlier Kwanzaa Celebrations (1995) were held in the church basement

with an assortment of activities and entertainment. Iris asked me often after mass to join the Kwanzaa Committee. After many years of attending the Kwanzaa Celebrations which later were included in the Sunday Mass of the Feast of The Holy Family and Iris gentle recruitment efforts, I joined the Kwanzaa Committee. Iris invited all parishioners to attend and partake in this annual December event. Iris often performed the solemn libations with Andrew Lyke during the Kwanzaa celebrations.

Mrs. Gueringer would share stories about her family after Sunday mass. She told me of a serious health crisis which she was so grateful to survive. She also credited her son-in-law who is a physician with overseeing her health care. May Mrs. Iris Gueringer rest in peace. May her legacy continue through her children and future family members.

In 2013, a befitting tribute to Iris was established to have a scholarship in her name. The Kwanzaa Committee held and will continue to hold fund raisers to raise money for the scholarship. The annual scholarship will be a loving reminder of a woman who is the epitome of a virtuous Catholic Mother.

This reflection article is humbly shared in appreciation for Iris' dedication and many years of service as a Kwanzaa Team Member. It is also submitted for publication in gratitude for the contributions and the use of various God given talents of Mrs. Gueringer and other founding members. Their insights have ensured that Kwanzaa's purpose is shared with all members of St. Lawrence O'Toole Catholic Church.

A New Black Civil Rights Movement

As a 17-year-old African American student, I spent last month learning about Black History Month. From my research, I can clearly see the history of oppression that left our neighborhoods poor, my peers incarcerated, and our schools failing.

However, rather than remaining in the past, I look to the future to ensure the promise of the American dream won't be denied to another generation of black children. But it's hard to be hopeful when far too often, my community has compromised our ideals and allowed politicians to assume the mantle of civil rights through their identity while they abandoned us through their actions.

In my home of Chicago, 52 High Schools are among the lowest performing 10% of schools in the state. A quarter of these schools hold the name of a prominent Civil Rights figure. Jackie Robinson served as a model of perseverance to the black community, and yet, the school named for him has been on probation for the last 5 years, qualifying as the worst elementary school in the city. 98% of Jackie Robinson students are black. Without the resources to find alternatives, an entire class of low-income students of color has been put at a permanent disadvantage relative to their luckier peers. Our children deserve a new Civil Rights Movement. It is no longer enough for elected officials to say that they "speak for the black community" without advancing policies that cure the status quo disease ailing our neighborhoods. Support of the black community is taken for granted by politicians whose skin color may resemble our own, but whose votes contradict our interests. Jackie Robinson is in the 26th district, represented by Christian Mitchell, a politician who understands the imperative of educational choice



for black students. Mitchell's support of high quality charter school authorizing through the Illinois Charter School Commission illustrates his support for expanding quality options for black kids. The Commission gives students in failing schools like Robinson other options and expanded choice.

Like Mitchell, Representative John Anthony and candidate Mark Batinick have education platforms beneficial to black students. Batinick prioritizes accountability, and just this month Anthony introduced "parent trigger" legislation, which would give parents control over their low performing school if 51% of them sign a petition.

Mitchell, Batinick, and Anthony represent the new civil rights leaders that give me hope. These men are different from the leaders our community is familiar with today. Two are black, one is white. One represents black communities whereas two do not. They represent the Republican and Democratic parties. Even though these pioneers do not mirror our community, they stand for students like me. They understand the plight of students in Jackie Robinson Elementary. They accept the responsibility of representing those who need change most, and advance policies beneficial to students in the black community.

They understand that just as Jackie Robinson demonstrated extraordinary success despite extraordinary odds, so too must our schools. As a 17-year old who escaped schools like these through scholarships to private schools, I hope you remember me and my peers who need your help most, but don't have the same legal voice as the adults who make decisions for

us. I urge you to support policies that will push for increased choice and innovation and people who refuse to submit to the status-quo who will tirelessly advocate for education reform in our communities.

Faith, Family and the Future

As a young person who grew up in the 70's, I observed many family traditions and noticed that many of my friends had similar traditions in their families. Like many in my neighborhood, attendance to Sunday church services were a weekly requirement and expected behavior. Though I was raised as a Catholic, I noticed that most of my neighbors instilled this behavior in their various families whether they were Baptist, Lutheran, COGIC, etc.



It was not unusual to have special clothes for Easter and Christmas that were purchased just for those special church days. Every little boy had that Easter suit for the family picture with the Easter Bunny. Girls were meticulously outfitted with colorful dresses, hats and purses as well. Early on, children were taught that the clothes were not just be fancy, but were part of a family tradition where you would go to church and learn about the miracle of Jesus.

Faith is something that families would pass down to their children like a precious heirloom with constant reminders about the importance of prayer and learning about the bible. Catholic children can relate to that gift of their first bible, Rosary or St.

Christopher medal. You were fed by your parents and grandparents a diet of "faith in things not seen" with a constant reminder that Jesus is real.

Whether a priest or preacher, we all remember images of women with the "Jesus" fans swaying to the message of the day as it filled the audience with joy. We did not always understand all of the words of the Our Father, but were meticulously taught by parents and teachers to memorize this important conversation

with the Father. Learning to say grace at meals was big deal as well.

It is important to recognize that these traditions of faith transfer at an early age have a profound impact on these children. Children are taught by their first teachers at home their priorities. Recently a movie *Heaven is Real* was released. It is the story of a young 4 year old who had a near death experience and went to heaven.

The paradox of the movie is the fact that the young character was the son of a Pastor who should by occupation be a man of faith. But when presented with evidence that his son truly believed that he went to heaven and met with Jesus, caused him to question his own Faith and ability to minister. It was lost on the adults in the movie that the young boy's description of Heaven and Jesus was biased Faith that the adults had given him. Ironically the adults didn't have faith. They had to learn from a child that God is Love and Heaven is Real!

I don't want to give away all the details of the movie, but essentially it is revealed that the Faith of this young person required others to step out on their Faith! The meek shall inherit the earth! Our future is being determined by the Faith of our children. We must continue to share our faith with our youth.

Recently a 9 year old boy name Willie Myrick was kidnapped in Atlanta, Georgia and held captive for 3

hours in a car. This young boy started singing "Every Praise is to our God" and was eventually released. Some would say, a mere coincidence and that his captor probably became weary of the child's off key singing. Perhaps..or maybe it was a young man who had been taught to have faith in God singing a song of redemption and gaining his freedom. He used his faith now use yours!

Redemptorist Priest to Head the Institute for Black Catholic Studies (IBCS) at Xavier University of Louisiana

New Orleans LA -

The Rev. Maurice Nutt, C.Ss.R., has been named the new director of the Institute for Black Catholic Studies (IBCS) at Xavier University of Louisiana, according to Provost and Sr. Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Loren Blanchard.

He comes to Xavier from the Redemptorist Parish Mission in Chicago IL, where he was a member of the Preaching Team.

Father Maurice Nutt, who specializes in preaching, evangelization, African American culture, spirituality, and community and church development, is no stranger to Xavier, having earned a Master of Theology from Xavier's IBCS in 1989 and having served as an Assistant Professor of Preaching at the Institute since 2007.

"We are blessed to have acquired the full-time services of Father Maurice, who will bring his boundless energy, dynamic leadership, and profound scholarship to the Institute, with which he has already developed such an intimate connection," said Blanchard. "We look forward to the vision he will bring to the Institute."

The IBCS, established in 1979 to help sustain and support the pastoral and intellectual needs of Black Catholics throughout the United States, offers a Master's degree in Pastoral Theology and continuing education units in Catechesis, leadership and youth/young adult ministry.

A native of St. Louis, Father Maurice Nutt professed vows in the Redemptorist congregation in 1983 and was ordained to the Roman Catholic priesthood in 1989. He has served as Pastor of Holy Names of Jesus and Mary Catholic Church in Memphis TN, as director of the African American Ministry Initiative in Chicago, Illinois Pastor, and as Pastor of St. Alphonsus Liguori Catholic Church in St. Louis, Missouri.

A member of the Board of Directors for the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus, he has also served as an Adjunct Professor for Hampton



University's Online Religious Studies Program where he taught Pentecostalism and Introduction to Christian Theology.

Fr. Maurice was also an Adjunct Professor at St. Louis University's Department of Theology where he taught a course on the Black Religious Experience.


In addition to his Xavier degree, he also holds a Doctorate of Ministry from Aquinas Institute of Theology with a concentration in Preaching, and a Master of Divinity degree from Catholic Theological Union.

He is the author of three books: *Thea Bowman: In My Own Words*, *Advent and Christmas Wisdom from St. Alphonsus Liguori*, and *Lent and Easter Wisdom from St. Alphonsus Liguori*. He is also a contributor to the African American Catholic Youth Bible, a collaborative project between the National Black Catholic Congress and St. Mary's Press to be published in 2014.

Father Maurice Nutt succeeds Dr. Pamela Franco, Executive Associate in the Office of Academic Affairs, who served as interim IBCS director for three years.
